ANZAC MEMORIAL

Vale Warren Bernard Grant



The Retired Telecommunications Employees Association is sad to report the passing of Warren Grant on Thursday, 25th April 2024. A Requiem Mass for Warren was held at St Mary's Catholic Church, Grafton, on Thursday, May 9th, 2024.

Warren was born in 1942 in Lismore.

Warren was a member of our Association for twenty-six years (Membership No: 415).

Warren had suffered from ill health for several years; however, his sudden passing was unexpected. Warren was a 1958 Technician in Training. After an initial year of training in Sydney, the PMG would assign trainees to various locations throughout NSW. The NSW North Coast was a very popular location, and there was much demand among the many trainees who hoped to be assigned there. While not making it back to his hometown of Lismore, Warren received an appointment in the Grafton area. Warren immediately liked Grafton, where he was to spend his career.

Warren married Pauline in 1963, and they had four children: Kathy, Bernadette, Larissa, and Paul.

Warren was very generous with his time supporting many organisations within the Grafton community. These included his work with the Catholic Church, St. Vincent de Paul, and the Sailing and Aero Clubs. Warren was president of the South Grafton Conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was the society's regional president, and during his time as president, the society was able to fund the construction of an aged care home in Coffs Harbour.

Warren was involved with the local branch of the Union and also represented the Union at a State and National level.

The Retired Telecommunications Employees Association extends its condolences and deep sympathy to Warren's wife, Pauline, and children Kathy, Bernadette, Larissa and Paul, their respective families and his many workmates on the North Coast and fellow 1958 trainees.

The Association thanks Allan Crouch for informing us of Warren's passing. Alan and Warren and their families were neighbours and friends for many years. Warren and Allan had worked together at Grafton from 1961.

The ferry departs Woy Woy Wharf at 9.35 am and will return around 12.45 pm
The Association will arrange a table for lunch at the Woy Woy Hotel.

For members travelling from Sydney, a train leaves Central at 7:45 a.m. arriving at Woy Woy at 9:02 a.m. The walk from Woy Woy Railway to the wharf terminal is 350 metres (see map below)

Day 1 - Sunday, 10th November 2024

We will begin our travel to Coffs Harbour and have morning tea alongside the coach. We will stop at Taree for lunch and have time to enjoy a stroll along the Manning River.

Continuing our journey, we will call into the Maria River Distillery to listen to a talk and have an opportunity to purchase from their range of gins and rum. Finally, we arrive at Coffs Harbour and settle into our rooms before dinner.

Day 2 - Monday, 11th November 2024)

Grafton and Woolgoolga

Today, we journey up the Pacific Hwy to visit the City of Grafton. Grafton is named the Jacaranda City because of the Jacaranda trees throughout town. Grafton celebrates a Jacaranda Festival every year.

We will stop at a sea park for morning tea alongside the coach. We will do a town tour of Grafton, including a stop at the old Grafton Jail, built in 1893 and now heritage-listed. Then, visit the Christ Church Cathedral, constructed in 1894.

On our return to Coffs Harbour, we will stop in the beautiful seaside town of Woolgoolga, and there we will have an afternoon before our return to our motel. Our visit to Grafton is just one week after the Jacaranda Festival, so all the trees should be in blossom.





Day 3 - Tuesday, 12th November 2024

Dorrigo & Bellingen

During the morning, we drive up into the hinterland of the Coffs Harbour coast. Then, we drive across to Dorrigo Rainforest Centre, explore the information centre, and stroll on one of the walks, including a skywalk.

After working up an appetite, we head back to Bellingen, visit the old butter factory, and listen to a talk about the factory's history, which dates back to 1906. We will enjoy lunch at the factory and then have some free time to explore Bellingen before returning to the motel.

Day 4 - Wednesday, 13th November 2024

Coffs Harbour

We will have a local day in Coffs Harbour, driving up (depending on road conditions) to the Sealy Park Lookout, 310 metres above Coffs Harbour. There, you will see spectacular views from the sky pier.

On our return, we will visit the Coffs Harbour Wildlife Sanctuary to learn about their work rescuing wildlife and enjoy the Dolphin show after a short drive to the Coffs Harbour jetty for lunch and a stroll around the harbour. We will take a walk along to the mutton bird lookout.

In the afternoon, we visit a piece of Holland in Coffs Harbour. Known as the clog barn, we explore this unique attraction that is not found anywhere else in Australia. Have the chance to explore the shop and see how they make clogs.

Day 5 (Thursday, 14th November 2024)

Urunga and Bowraville

This morning, we will take a drive down to Urunga. This town is the meeting point of the Kalang and Bellinger Rivers, where both empty into the Pacific Ocean. We take in these views while wandering along the elevated Urunga boardwalk.

Next, we visit today's sweet spot: the Urunga Honey place. We will see the world of the honeybee with the glass viewing area and have an opportunity to sample the local honey.

After lunch, we take a short drive up to the small town of Bowraville. We have the afternoon to explore the folk and military museums or the township before returning to the motel for our last night away.



Day 6 (Friday, 15th November 2024)

Return travel to Sydney with a refreshment break at a service centre. Lunch at Nabiac at the hotel or one of the other cafes before arriving back in Sydney in the late afternoon, after a thoroughly enjoyable trip away.



The Henry Sutton Story

A few months ago, I wrote an article for our newsletter about the introduction of telephony. While researching the article, I came across Henry Sutton, an Australian inventor from Ballarat. I mentioned his central contribution to introducing the new telephony technology in Australia. However, Henry Sutton's inventions went far beyond telephony.

Henry Sutton was born in a tent on the Ballarat goldfields in 1855. Until the age of ten, his mother Mary educated him. Afer, he attended a state school and college btween 1860 and 1872. He trained s a draftsman at the Ballarat School of Design where he won many prizes for drawing.

Since the article, I have done further research into Henry Sutton and came across a transcript from ABC's

Science Show, which was broadcast in 2012, coinciding with the 100th anniversary of Henry Sutton's death. Robyn Williams, the show's presenter, played a talk by Professor Mark Dodgson from Queensland University.

Professor Dodgson described Sutton as perhaps Australia's greatest inventor and claimed there are grounds for calling Sutton one of the greatest inventors of all time. Alexander Graham Bell when he visited Australia and Sutton's town of Ballarat was undoubtedly impressed with Sutton's telephony system that Sutton had installed in his Ballarat Music store and another at the Ballarat School of Mines, where he worked. Bell and Sutton became lifelong friends who often corresponded.



Professor Dodgson described Sutton's interests as broad and eclectic, mirrored by his many types of inventions. Apart from inventions, Sutton's achievements were the establishment of Victoria's Scientific Instruments and the foundation of the Automobile Club of Victoria.

Before focusing on Sutton's major inventions, it is essential to understand range of Sutton's inventions across a range of technologies, many at their early stages.

Batteries - In 1861, Sutton developed a new rechargeable battery, which he patented the following year.

Microscopy - in 1865, after cholera on a ship in Queensland. Sutton obtained a slide and managed to photograph the slide of the germ at 1000 times magnification.

Photography - in the 1880s, Sutton also devised a colour photography process.

Television - In 1865, Sutton designed, but did not construct, a mechanical television apparatus to see the Melbourne Cup in Ballarat.

Sutton published his *telephane* (the name Sutton referred to his TV system) designs in 1890. According to the global history network of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, the telefane was a forerunner to television, developed three years before its inventor, John Logie Baird, was born.

Facsimile - Sutton used his telephane system to demonstrate facsimile transmission with the help of Nicola Tesla in England.

Lifts - For the benefit of his paralyzed mother, he designed a new hydraulic mechanism to drive the lift in his Music Emporium. This design was subsequently used

by the Austral Otis company and exported for use in America

Automotive. – Sutton produced several automobiles of his design (somewhere between six and eight) in 1897. From 1898, he held patents for improvements in combustion engine carburettors. In 1899, Sutton built and drove the Sutton Autocar, one of the first motor cars in Australia.

Professor Dodgson concluded his talk by describing Sutton as a rare genius who dances to their own tune. He quoted the Australian Dictionary of Biography, which explains how Sutton worked tirelessly, with 'daylight sometimes surprising him every morning for a week'.
